

Assisting with watershed & floodplain planning throughout the basin



A key function of the Virgin River Program is to reconcile and **avoid potential conflicts** between water **development** and wildlife **conservation**. The Program simplifies regulatory processes for water users and landowners while ensuring that future generations can enjoy Utah's natural heritage.
